VERB TENSES: FUTURE

Future Tense expresses actions that have not happened yet as opposed to actions that are happening now or have already happened. The Future Tense most commonly appears in the form **Simple Future Tense**, but occasionally you will use other forms of the Future Tense like **Future Progressive Tense** and **Future Perfect Progressive Tense**. Below, you will find examples of each of these forms.

SIMPLE FUTURE TENSE

Simple Future Tense expresses actions that will happen in the future.

Example: I *will walk* to class tomorrow.

Singular	Plural
I will walk	We will walk
You will walk	You (all) will walk
He/she/it will walk	They will walk

Simple Future Tense = will + VERB.

EXAMPLES:

- 1. I *will cook* dinner tonight.
- 2. Katelyn *will finish* her homework later.
- 3. They *will play* against their rival team tomorrow.

FUTURE PROGRESSIVE TENSE

Future Progressive Tense expresses actions that will be in the process of happening at a specific future time.

Example: I *will be* walking to class tomorrow at noon.

Singular	Plural
I will be walking	We will be walking
You will be walking	You (all) will be walking
He/she/it will be walking	They will be walking

Future Progressive Tense = will be + VERB + -ing.

Examples:

- 1. I *will be working* from 9 am to 3 pm tomorrow.
- 2. She *will be living* in this apartment for six more months.
- 3. We *will be studying* tonight, so we can't go see a movie with you.

FUTURE PERFECT TENSE

Future Perfect Tense expresses **actions that will happen before other future actions.** Example: I *will have walked* to the mall already by the time you get there.

Singular	Plural
I will have walked	We will have walked You (all) will have walked
You will have walked	You (all) will have walked
He/she/it will have walked	They will have walked

Future Perfect Tense = will have + PAST PARTICIPLE (usually VERB + -ed).

Examples:

- 1. She *will have finished* her homework by the time her mother gets home.
- 2. We *will have cleaned* the whole house by the time you finish mowing the lawn.
- 3. The students *will have read* so many textbooks by the end of the semester.

FUTURE PERFECT PROGRESSIVE TENSE

Future Perfect Progressive Tense reflects on **actions that will have been happening for** a certain length of time in the future.

Example: I *will have been walking* for half an hour by the time I get to class.

Singular	Plural
I will have been walking	We will have been walking
You will have been walking	You (all) will have been walking
He/she/it will have been walking	They will have been walking

Future Perfect Progressive Tense = will have been + VERB + -ing.

Examples:

- 1. She *will have been studying* for six hours by the time she goes to bed.
- 2. Next month, I *will have been working* in this field for ten years.
- 3. We *will have been running* for almost half an hour by the time the race is over.
