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About the Institution

Regent University is the nation's academic center for Christian thought and action, with a multitude of on-campus and online programs available worldwide. Our academic standards for both our graduate and undergraduate programs are high, and our programs are rigorous. But what sets Regent apart is our mission to prepare capable men and women to excel both in mind and spirit. Our students, faculty, and administrators share a calling founded on biblical principles to make a significant difference in our communities, cities, nation, and world.

Leadership and Influence

When Dr. M.G. "Pat" Robertson established the university in 1978, he envisioned a high-caliber institution that would attract a leadership team brimming with superior professional experience and extraordinary academic credentials. In just three decades, that vision is being fulfilled. Distinguished faculty and guest lecturers include John Ashcroft, former U.S. Attorney General; Vern Clark, former Chief of Naval Operations; Steve Forbes, president and CEO of Forbes, Inc., and others.

Regent also exposes students to speakers who are front and center on some of the most important issues of our time. Nationally covered events such as Clash of the Titans®, The Ronald Reagan Symposium, and Executive Leadership Series allow students and the greater community to learn firsthand from the major world and national leaders about today's most pressing issues.

The combination of committed leaders and diligent students has produced alumni who occupy strategic positions in a multitude of venues worldwide. They take their call to lead and serve others seriously and excel in their professions, including Virginia's 71st

Governor, Louisiana State Senator, National Middle School Principal of the Year, Hollywood screenwriters, National Milken Educator Award Winner, and Assistant Secretary of Labor.

History and Location

In 1977, CBN University was incorporated as a nonprofit educational institution in Virginia Beach, Virginia. The university was founded for the specific purpose of preparing leaders who would not only succeed in their professions but also advance as Christians equipped to impact their world effectively. In the fall of 1978, 77 students began classes in modest, rented facilities. By October 1989, CBN University had grown from the School of Communication & the Arts to seven professional schools with nearly 800 students. On January 1, 1990, in recognition of this growth, the board of trustees voted to change the name of CBN University to Regent University. The university has grown to over 10,000 students earning associate's, bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees at our Virginia Beach campus or via online learning.

Regent Timeline

The Regent Timeline emphasizes the university's steady growth since those humble beginnings, as well as its commitment to academic excellence. Highlights from the beginning to today include:

1977

The university is incorporated as CBN University, a nonprofit graduate education institution.

1978

Dr. M.G. "Pat" Robertson is officially appointed president of, then, CBN University.

Students in the School of Communication & the Arts begin classes in September.

1980

The first-class graduates in May.

The School of Education opens in October.

The university dedicates its first building, the Administration Building, on campus in Virginia Beach.

1982

Ground is broken for the University Library.

The School of Business and the School of Divinity open.

1983

Robertson School of Government opens.

1984

The university receives full accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

1986

Regent University School of Law opens.

1988

The School of Psychology & Counseling is founded.

1990

The Board of Trustees votes to change the name of CBN University to Regent University.

1995

Regent opens its Washington, D.C., location.

1997

The School of Leadership Studies develops an online M.A. program in Organizational Leadership, marking Regent as a model for online graduate education.

2000

An undergraduate degree-completion program is introduced to give

working adults opportunities to complete bachelor's degrees in an accelerated format.

2002

The 135,000-square-foot Communication & Performing Arts Center opens as one of the most technologically advanced communication buildings on the East Coast.

2003

The 31,000-square-foot Student Center opens on campus in Virginia Beach, offering a close sense of community.

Regent celebrates 25 years of growth and influence with the kick-off of the Clash of the Titans® debate series.

2004

Kick-off of the annual intramural flag football championship game, dubbed the "Chili Bowl" in 2009 with the addition of an annual chili cook-off.

2006

Regent creates its School of Global Leadership & Entrepreneurship, the result of combining its School of Leadership Studies and School of Business.

2007

Regent Law produces the winning team of the American Bar Association's 2007 Negotiation Competition, succeeding Harvard.
Regent Commons fully furnished residential apartments open, boasting

four floor plans, a laundry room, a fitness center, and other amenities for students.

2008

Regent celebrates its 30th anniversary. The School of Undergraduate Studies launches Regent's first associate degree programs.

2011

Regent Law celebrates its 25th anniversary. Supreme Court Justice Samuel Alito visits campus to commemorate the milestone.

2012

Regent University's Board of Trustees approves the name change of the School of Undergraduate Studies to College of Arts & Sciences. Likewise, the School of Global Leadership & Entrepreneurship is renamed School of Business & Leadership.

2013

The 22,000-square-foot Chapel and connecting 36,000-square-foot Divinity Building open, providing a unifying venue where students, faculty, staff, and the community can experience the presence of God as well as classrooms, offices, and a welcome center.

2014

Regent opens its first science laboratory to support a new degree in Biophysical Sciences, marking the university's entry into deeper study of the natural and physical sciences.

2015

Regent's 20,000th graduate crosses the stage at Commencement on May 9, 2015. Regent Law's Moot Court program ranks in the Top 10 nationally. Distinguished Professors, Attorney General John Ashcroft and Admiral Vern Clark, mark 10 years of teaching at Regent.

The first of five 2016 White House hopefuls, former Florida governor Jeb Bush, speaks at Regent-hosted Presidential Candidate Forums. Ohio Governor John Kasich speaks one month later. Then, over the span of six days in February 2016, three more top contenders for the GOP presidential nomination visited the campus: Donald Trump, Senator Ted Cruz, and former Regent trustee Dr. Ben Carson. (Candidates from both parties were given the opportunity to share political ideas and campaign platforms in a balanced, non-debate format. Regent University does not endorse candidates for public office.)

2016

Regent achieves historic enrollment of 8,000 students for its March session. Regent introduces plans for a state-of-the-art Athletic Complex and welcomes its first athletic director and competitive track team.

Regent launches a partnership with Corbin Bernson's Home Theater films to produce *In-Lawfully Yours*. The film was written by a Communication & the Arts professor, and many COM students

received a professional film credit for their participation on set in production, editing, filming, and acting roles.

2017

Regent's School of Divinity achieves historic enrollment of 1,000 students for its March session. The university also celebrated its 10,000th student in total enrollment.

Regent announces its new team name, Regent Royals, derived from 1 Peter 2:9: "You are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, His own special people, that you may proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light."

Regent launches a multimillion-dollar state-of-the-art Cyber Range within the Institute for Cybersecurity. This hyper-realistic simulation platform is one of the nation's most powerful platforms offering real-world cyber-attack and defense training.

2018

Regent Law receives top overall bar passage rate in the Commonwealth of Virginia (February 2018).

Regent hosts first cybersecurity summit and also graduates first cybersecurity students.

College of Healthcare Sciences and School of Nursing launched, after unanimous approval in 2017 by the Regent University Board of

Trustees. First RN to B.S. in Nursing students graduate.

Regent is ranked among Top National Universities – *U.S. News & World Report*, 2019.

Regent is named a National Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense Education (CAE-CDE) by the National Security Agency (NSA) and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS). First B.S. in Cybersecurity students graduate.

Regent launches the Center for Christian Thought & Action, inspiring thought leaders from all over the world to tackle the profound and unsolvable problems of today’s culture.

CBN and Regent Christmas Village Inaugural event welcomed several thousand community members to campus for a free German town-inspired Christmas village complete with live nativity and a 40-foot Christmas tree.

2022

The [class of 2022 was the largest graduating class](#) in Regent's history. Regent's 42nd Commencement exercises were celebrated on campus with the three highest-ranking officials in the Commonwealth of Virginia: Gov. Glenn Youngkin gave the keynote address at Commencement; Lt. Gov. Winsome Earle-Sears was honored as Regent's Alumna of the Year; and Atty. Gen. Jason Miyares gave the keynote address at the School of Law Commissioning ceremony.

The fall 2022 on-campus freshman cohort was 10% larger than last fall, and these incoming freshmen had an average GPA of 3.67—the highest average GPA in Regent history.

[The Regent University Honors College](#) welcomed its largest cohort of entering freshmen—with an average entering GPA of 3.98. The Honors College also welcomed a new dean, [Dr. Simon Tarr](#), in July 2022.

Regent launched 17 new undergraduate certificates—with three to six classes each—offered both online and on-campus.

Regent formed a new [study abroad partnership with Hebrew University of Jerusalem](#), a public research university founded by Albert Einstein.

To honor the nation's first responders, Regent deployed a [25% tuition discount](#) for firefighters, law enforcement, emergency medical services, and rescue workers.

Regent unveiled a new [Institute of Music & Worship](#)—a world-class center for innovative training in music and worship arts to train the next generation of musicians and worship leaders for global impact.

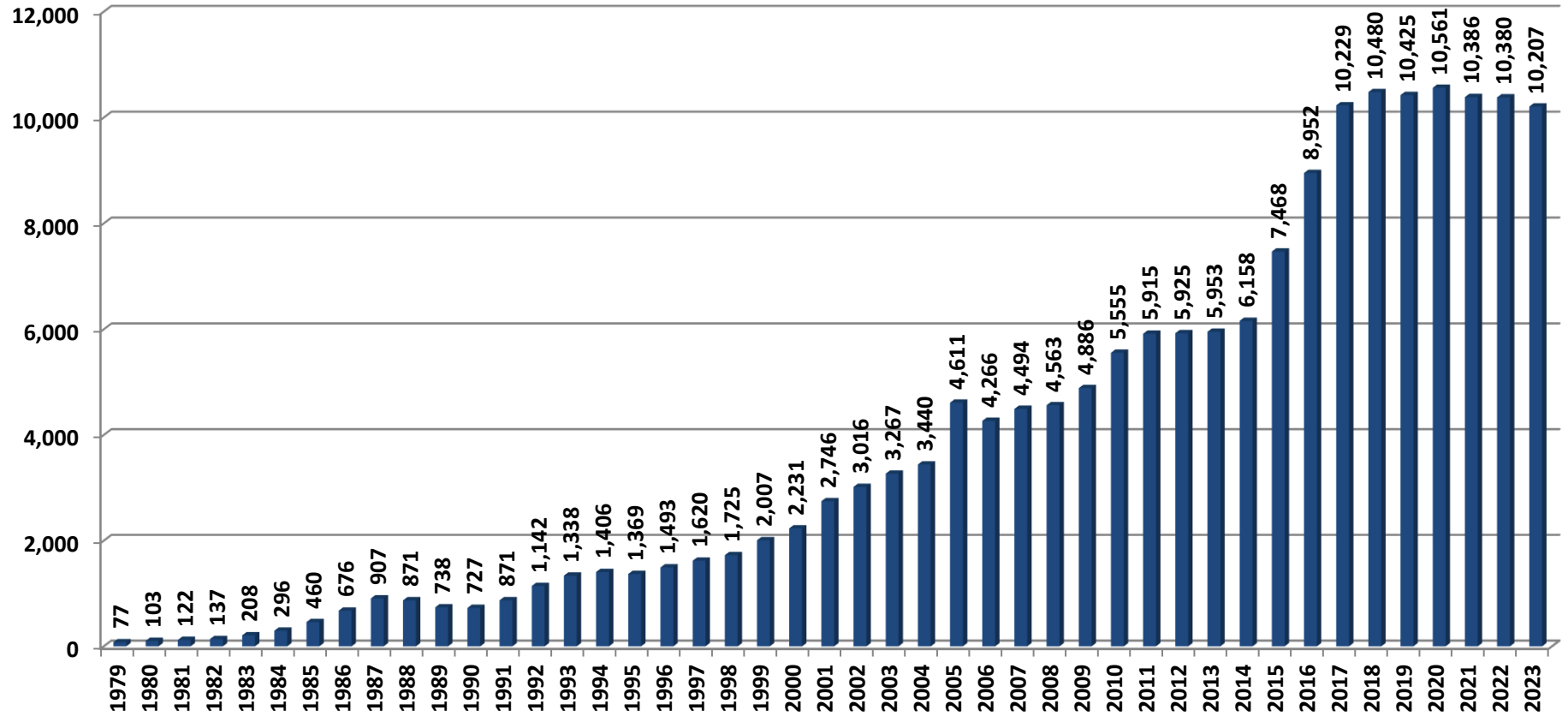

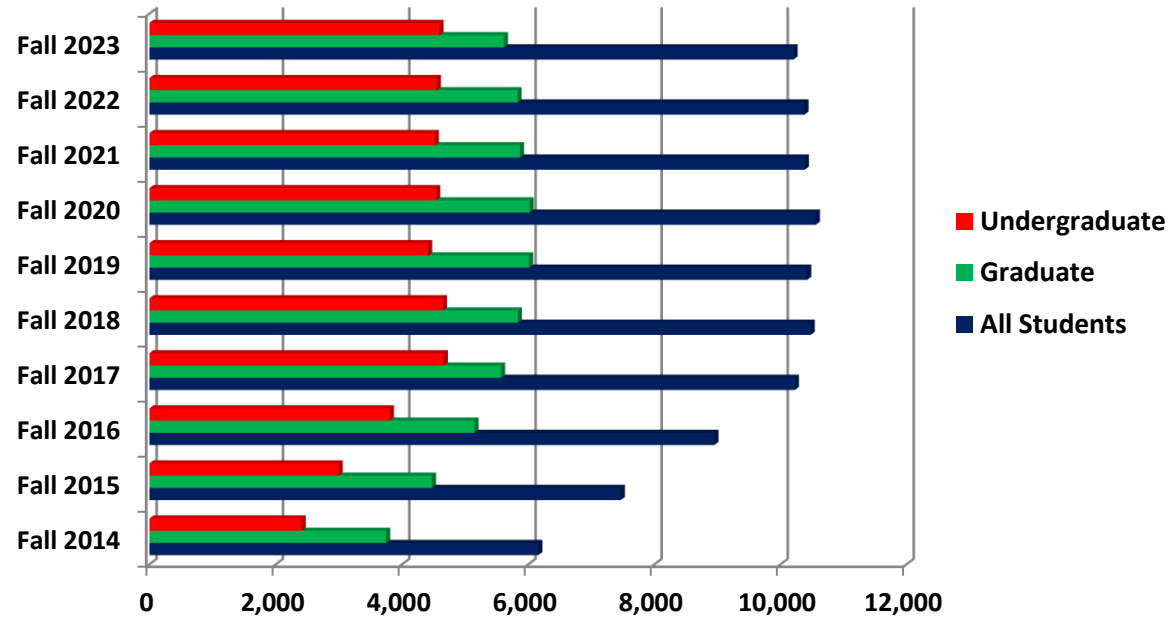

Student Enrollment History 1979-2023

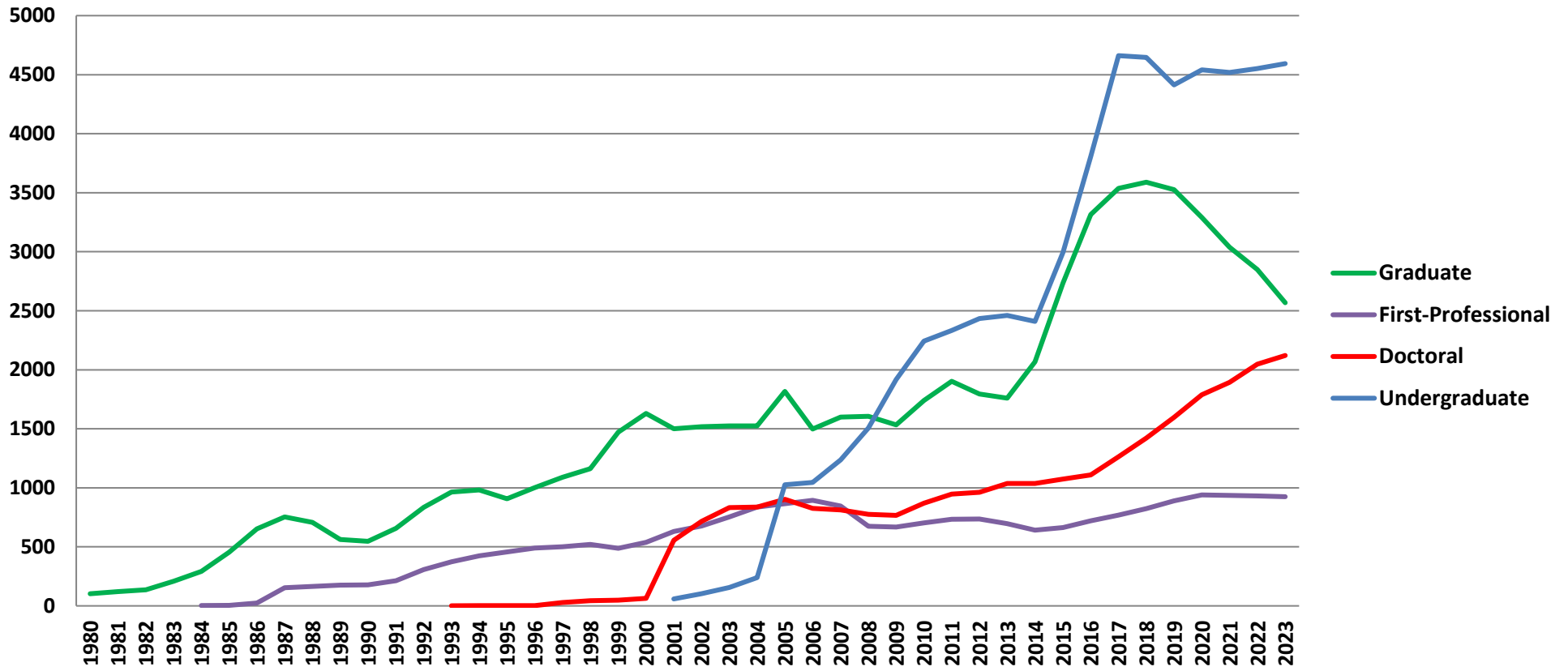

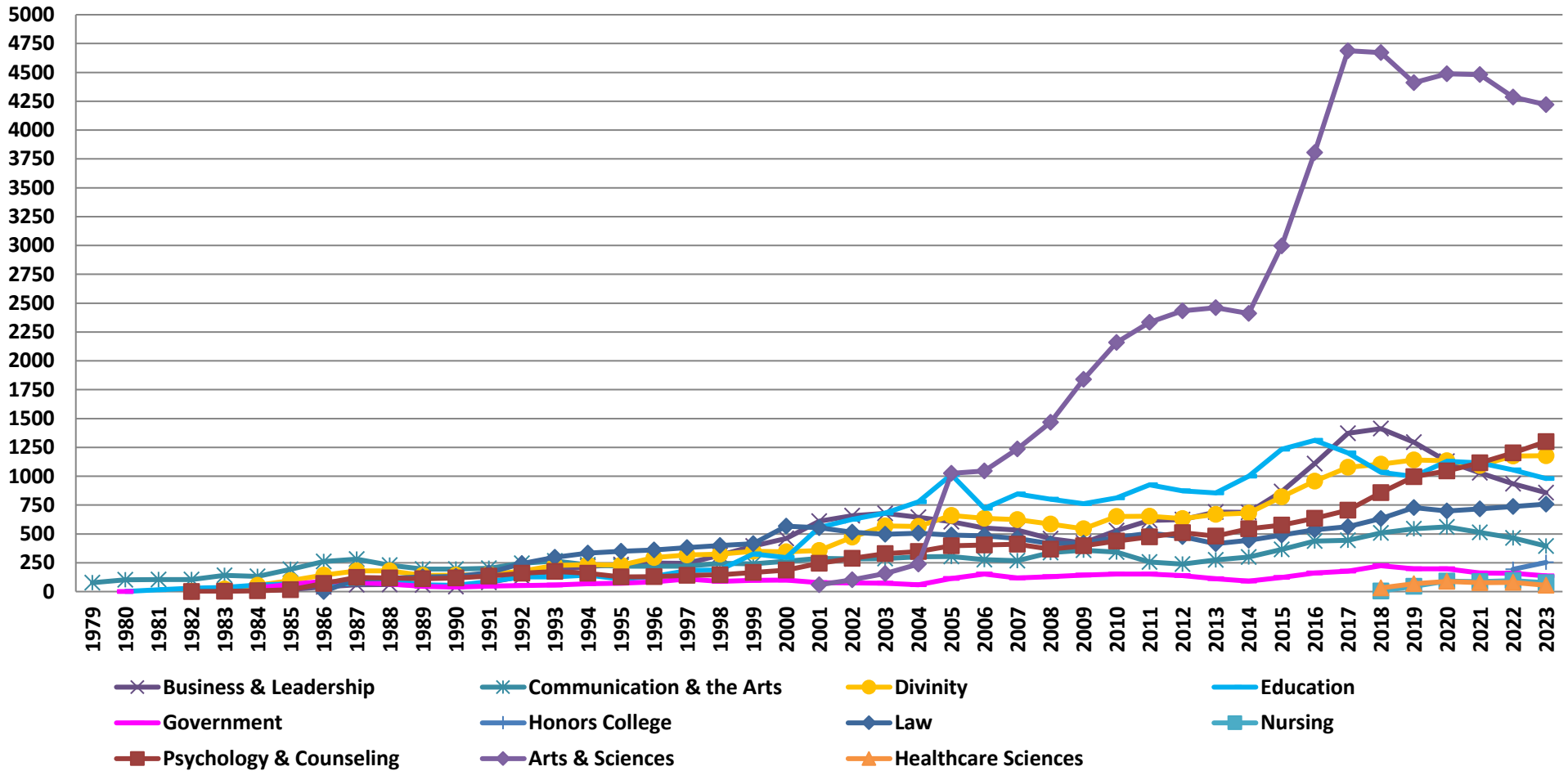
**Student Enrollment by Level
Fall 2014 to Fall 2023**



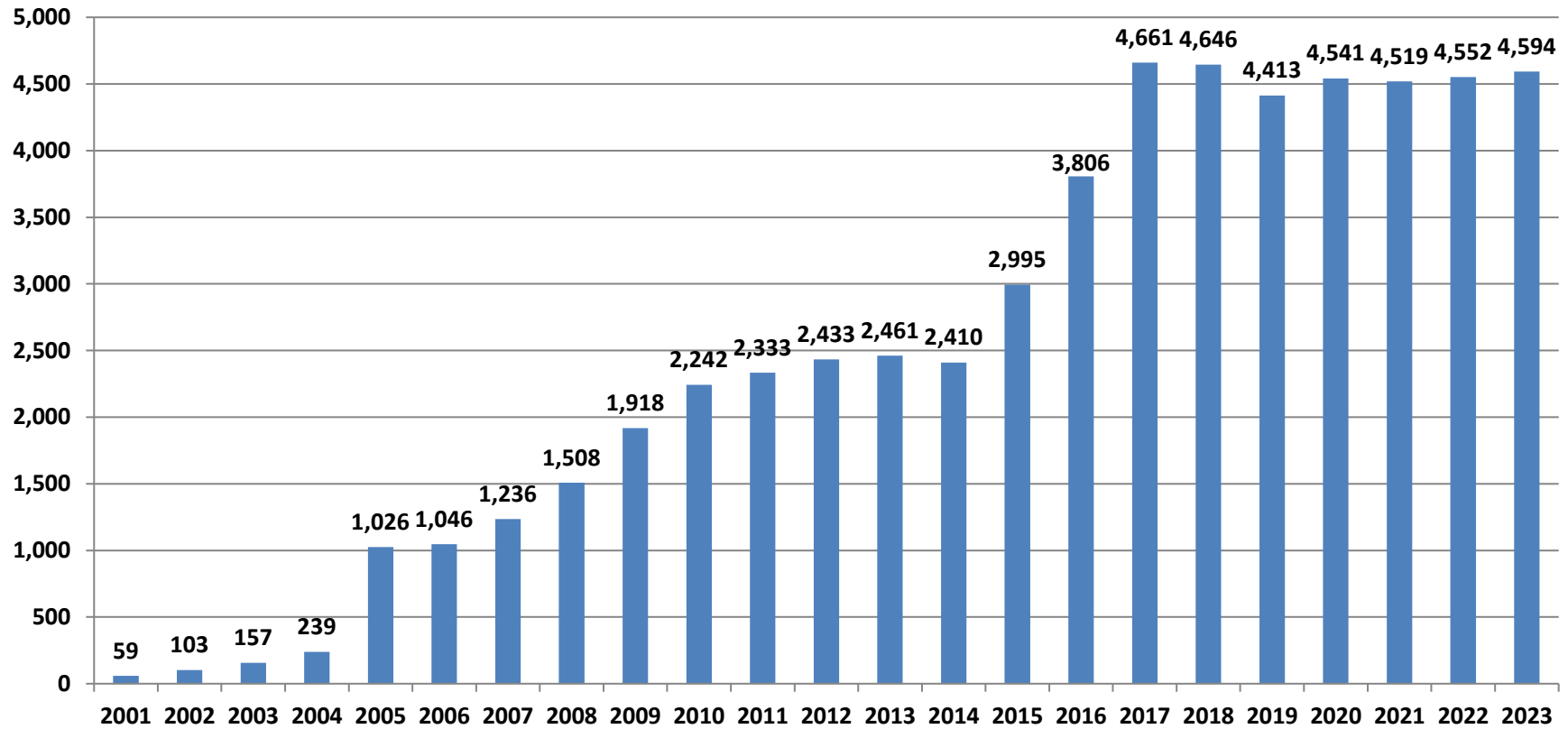
Student Enrollment by Level Fall Terms 1979-2023



Student Enrollment by School and College Fall Terms 1979-2023



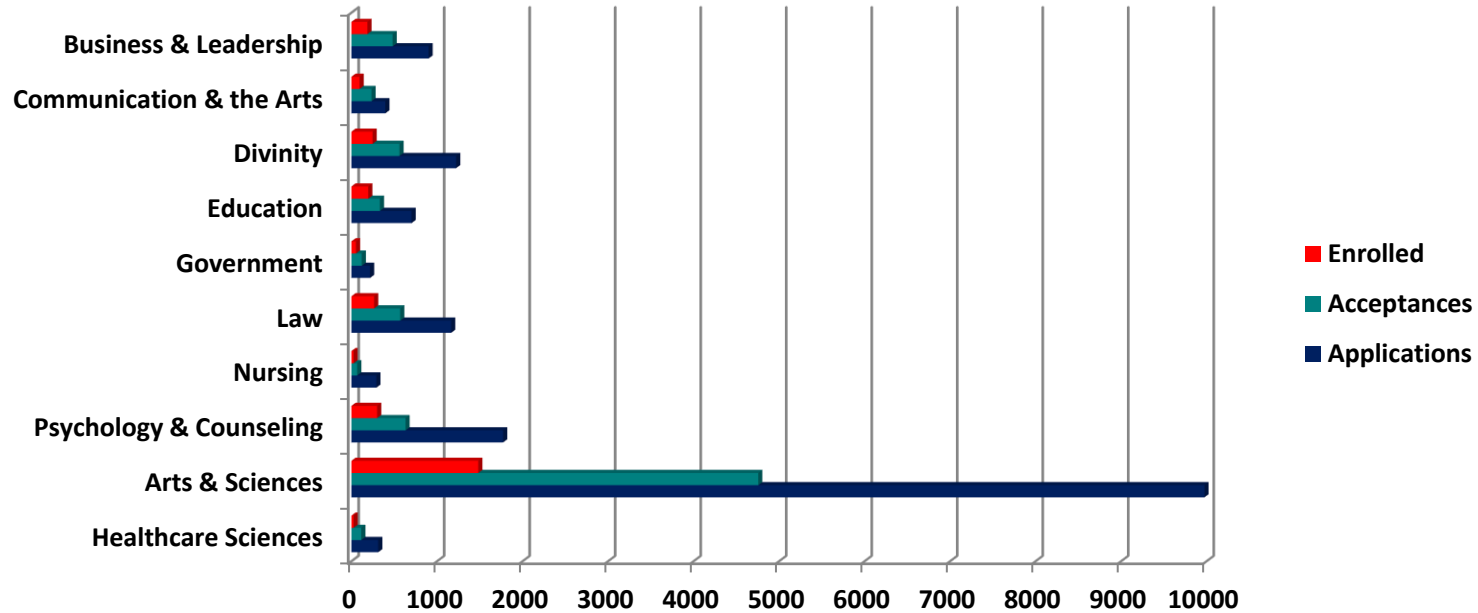
Undergraduate Student Enrollment Fall Terms 2001-2023

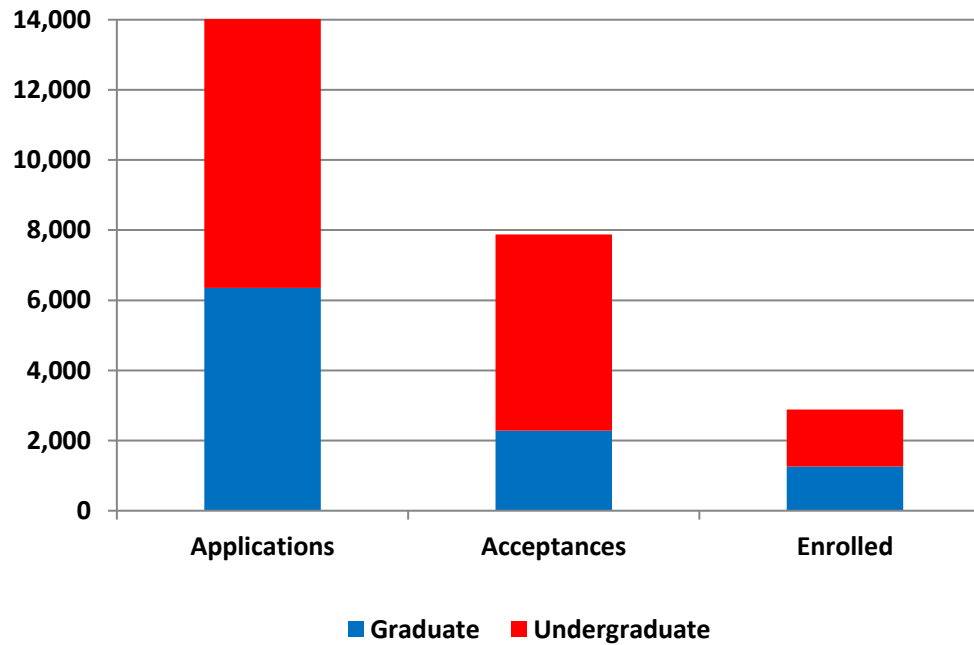
Fall 2022 Admissions by School

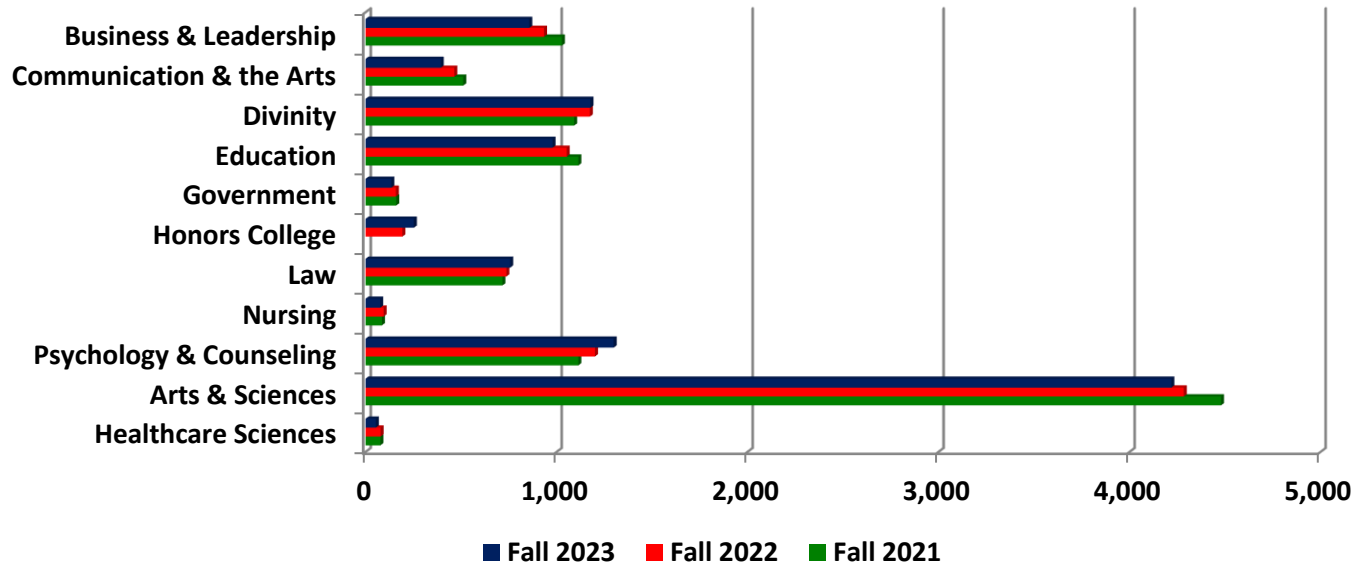
Fall 2022 Admissions by Level



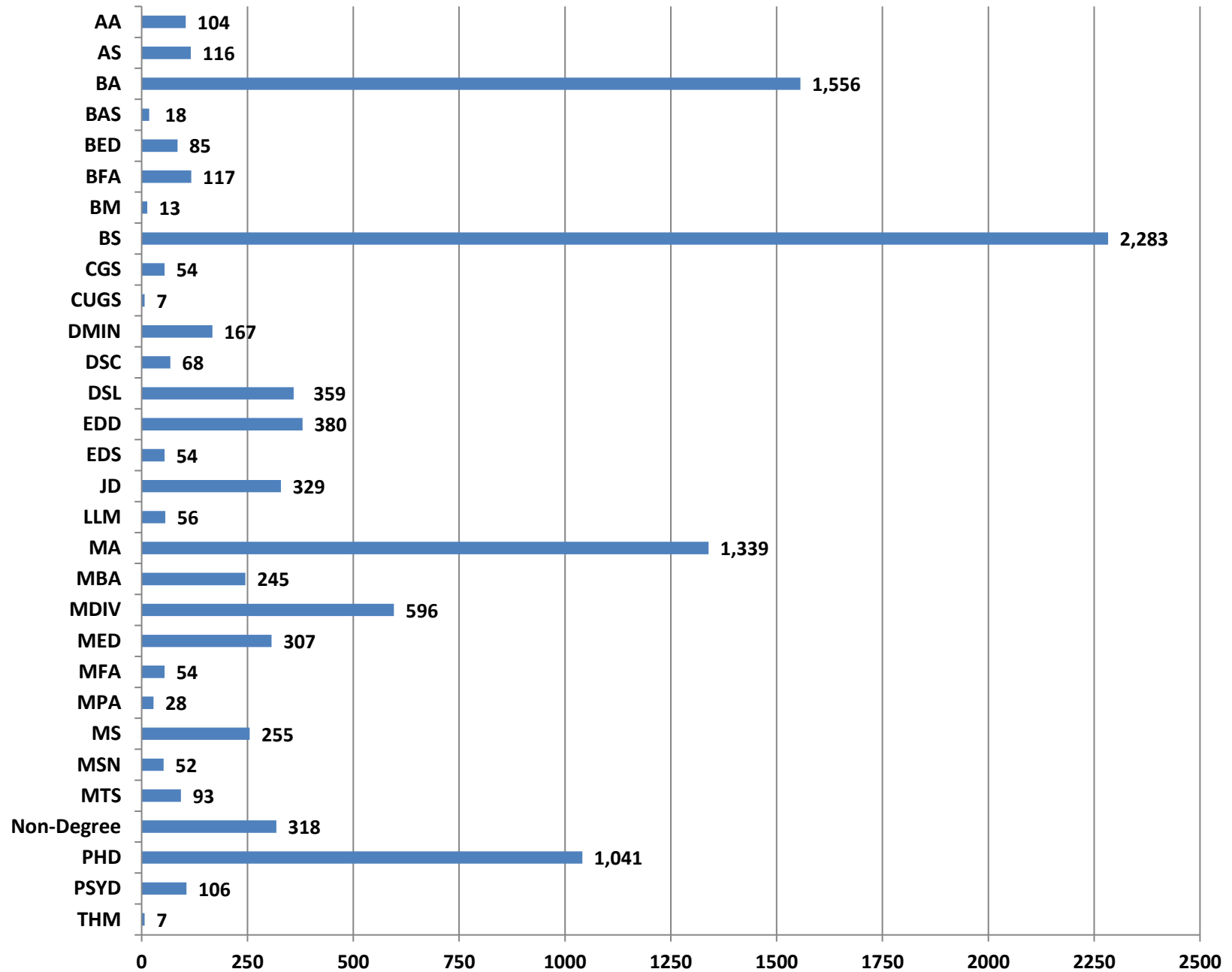

Student Enrollment by School: Fall 2021-2023



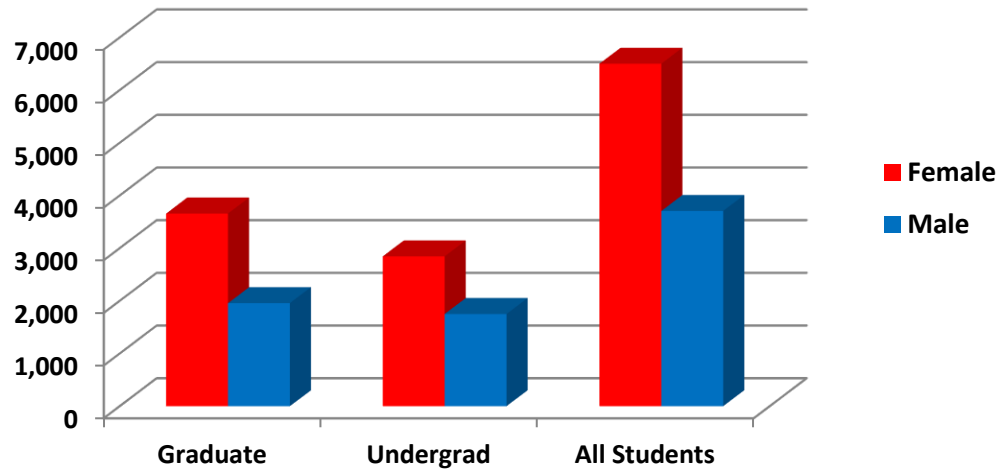
Students by Degree Fall 2023

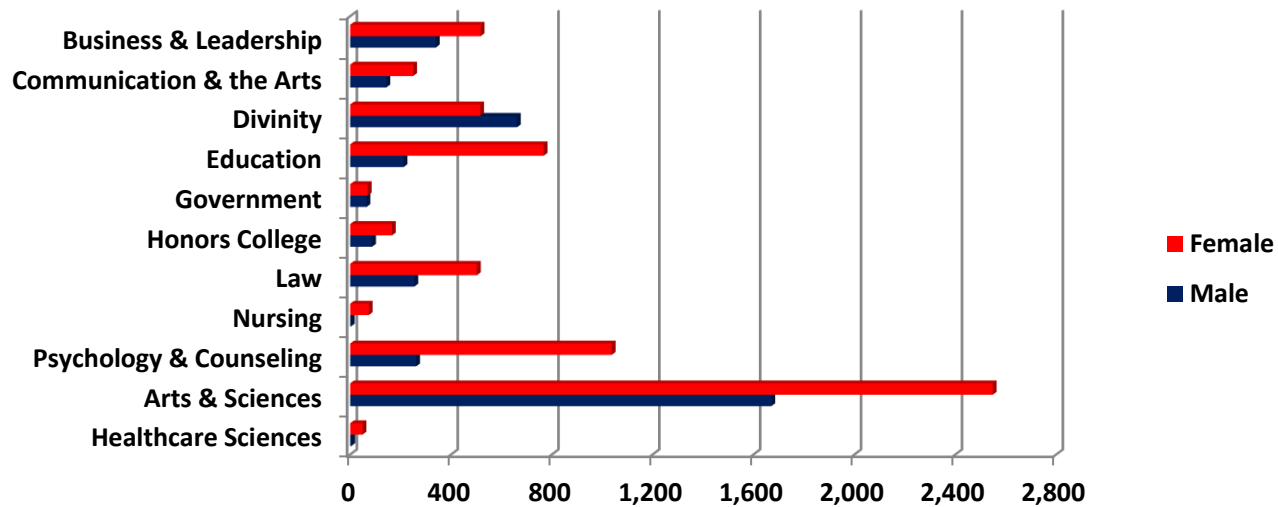
Student Enrollment by Gender

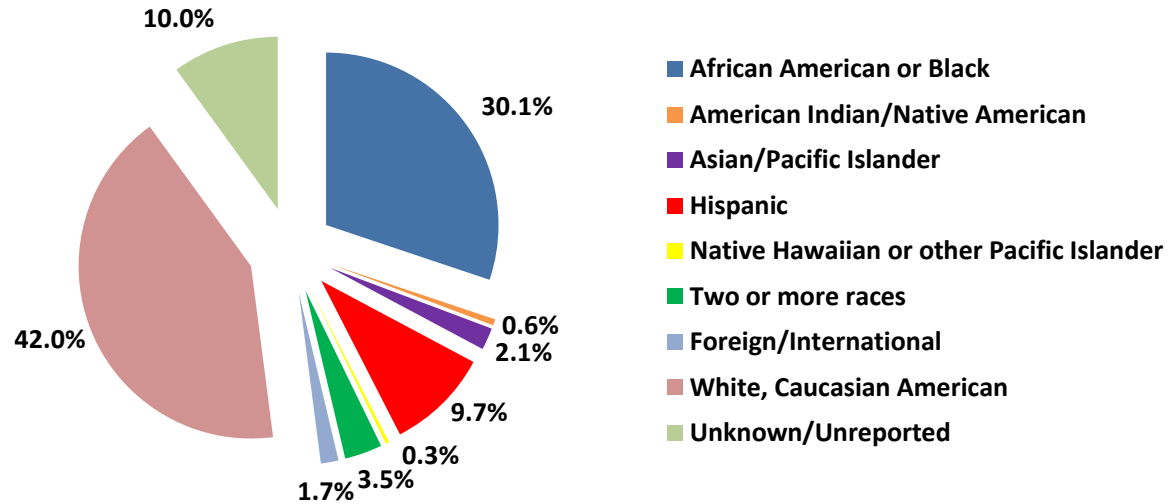
Student Gender by School: Fall 2023

Fall 2023 Student Race/Ethnicity by School

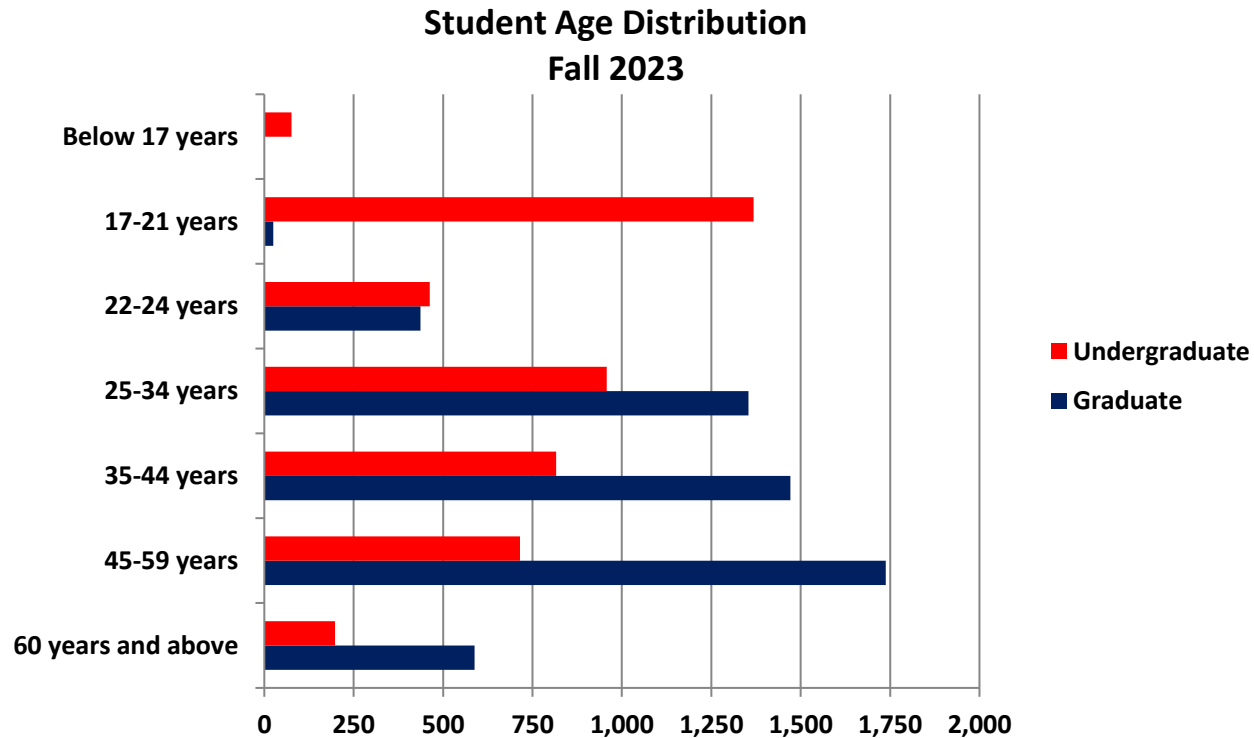

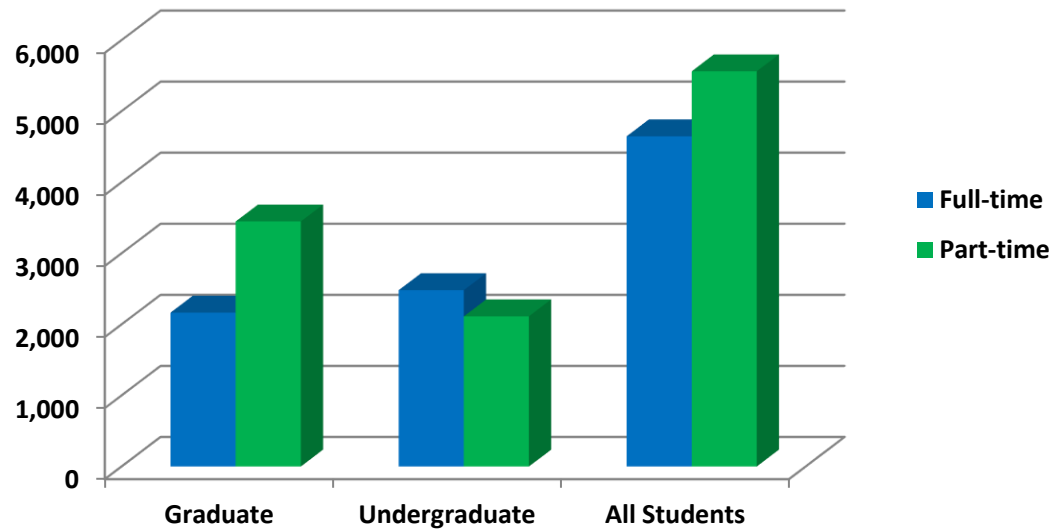

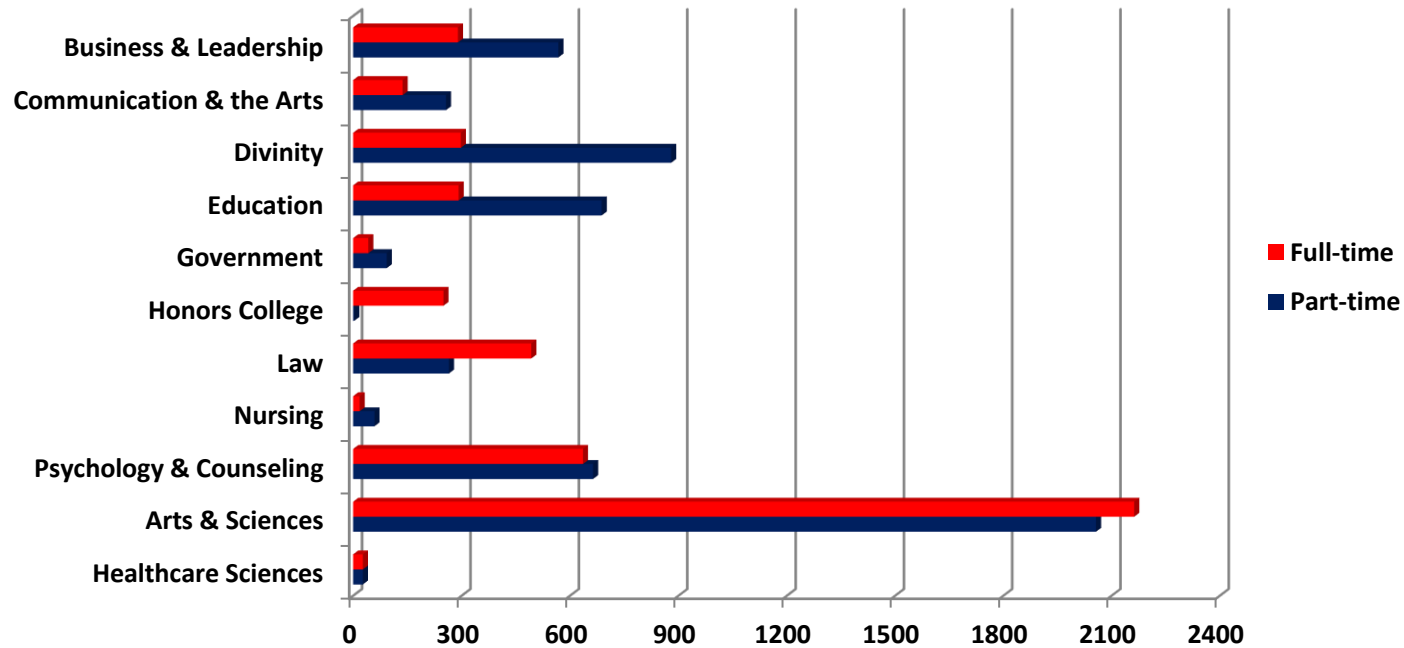
Student Enrollment Status

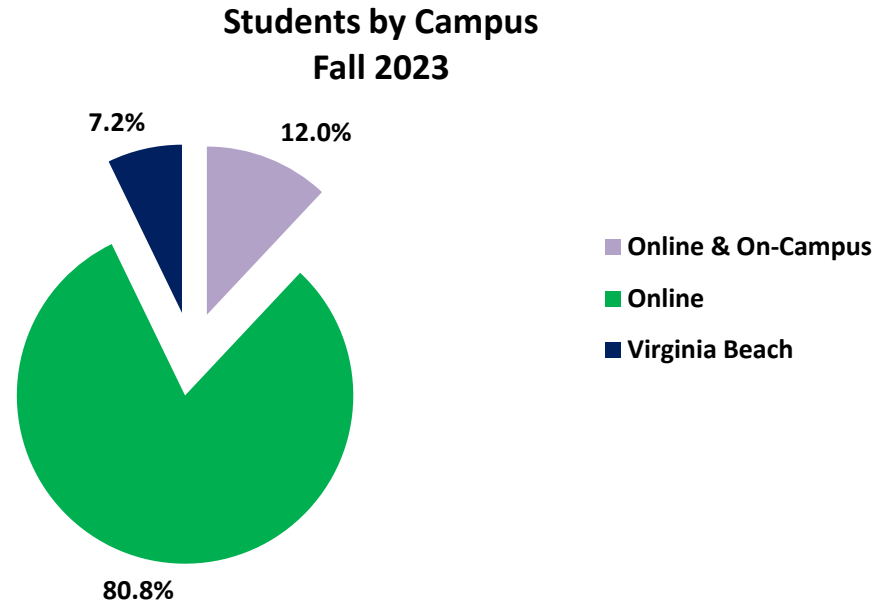

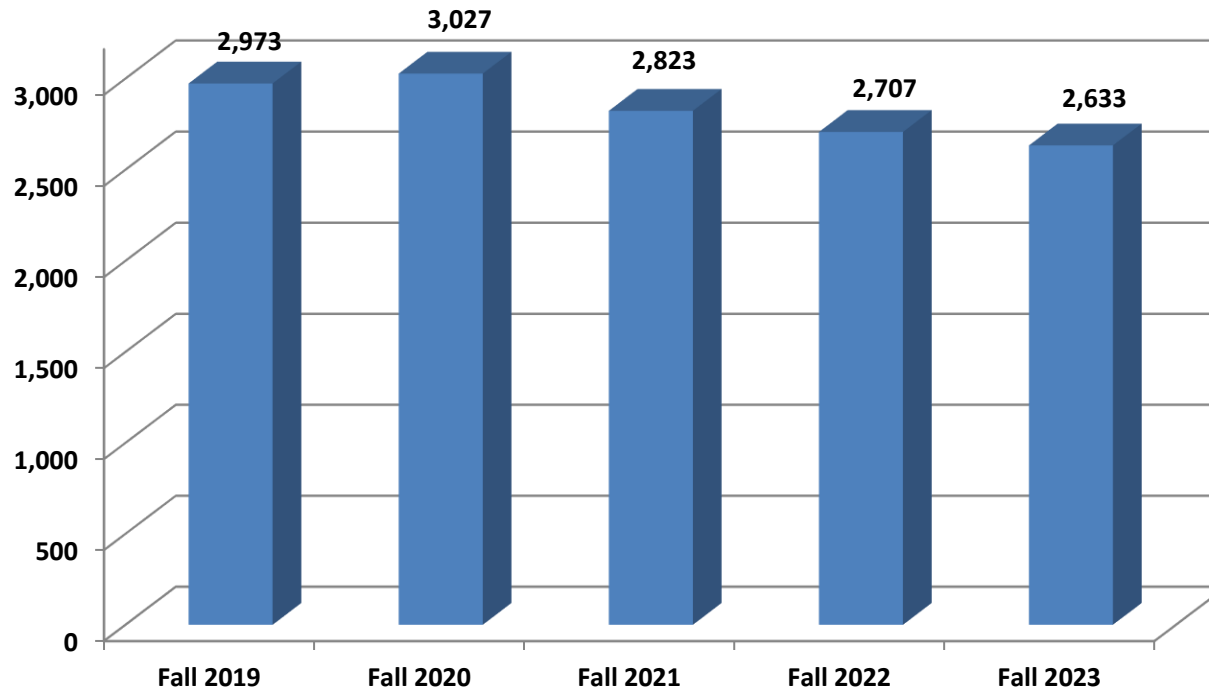

Military Student Enrollment

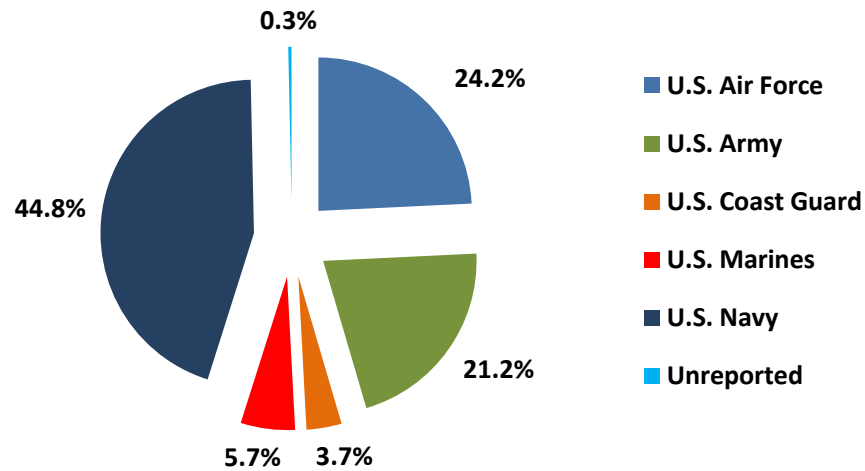

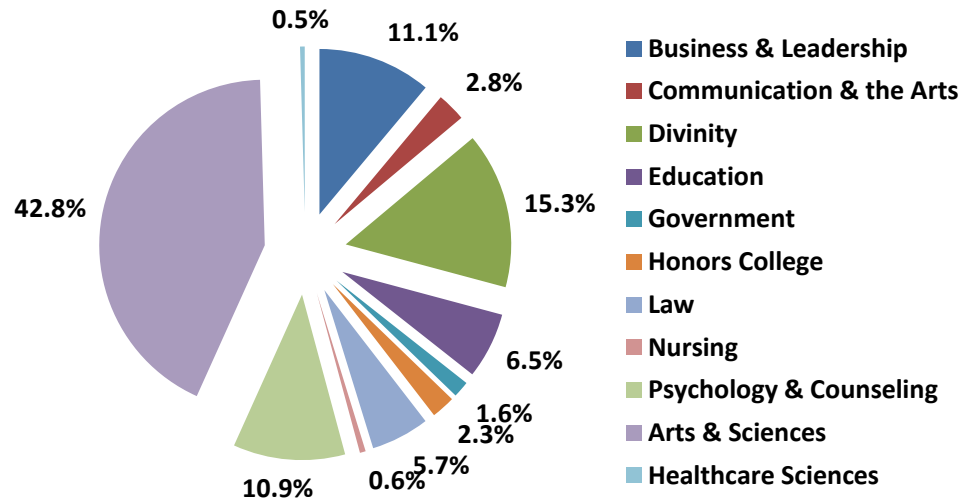
Fall 2023 Active Duty Military by Branch

Fall 2023 Military Student Enrollment by School



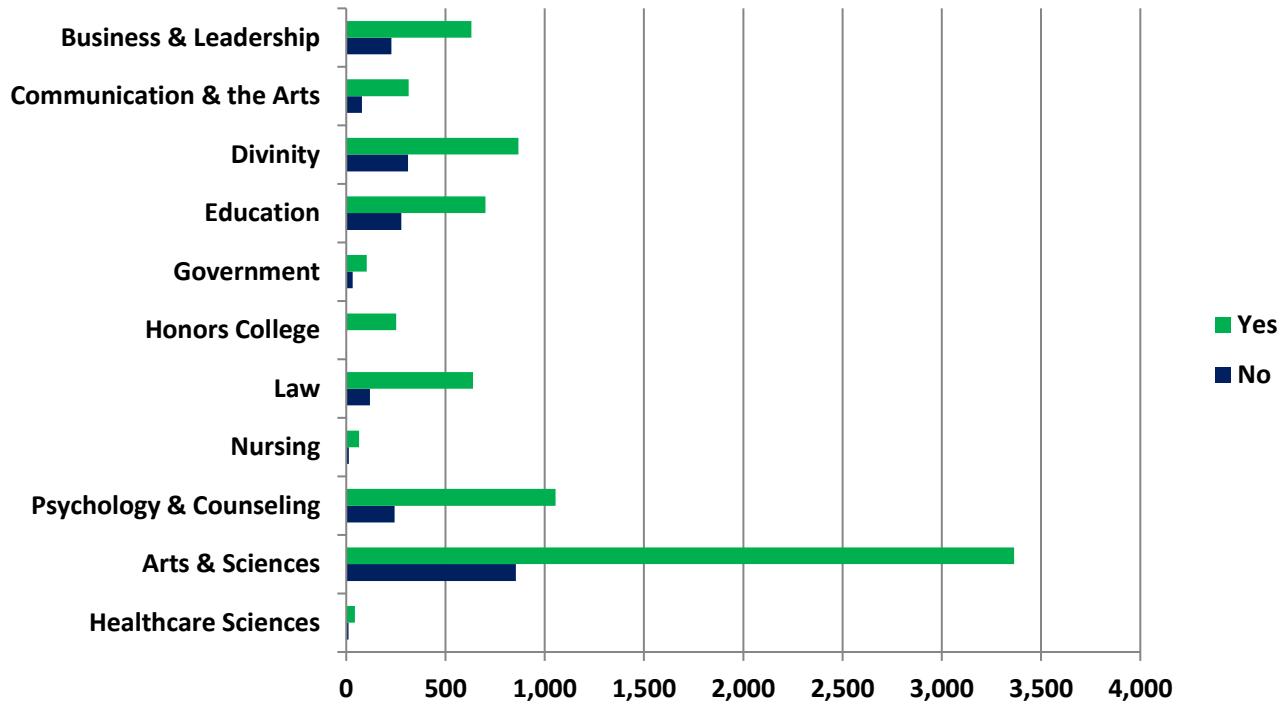

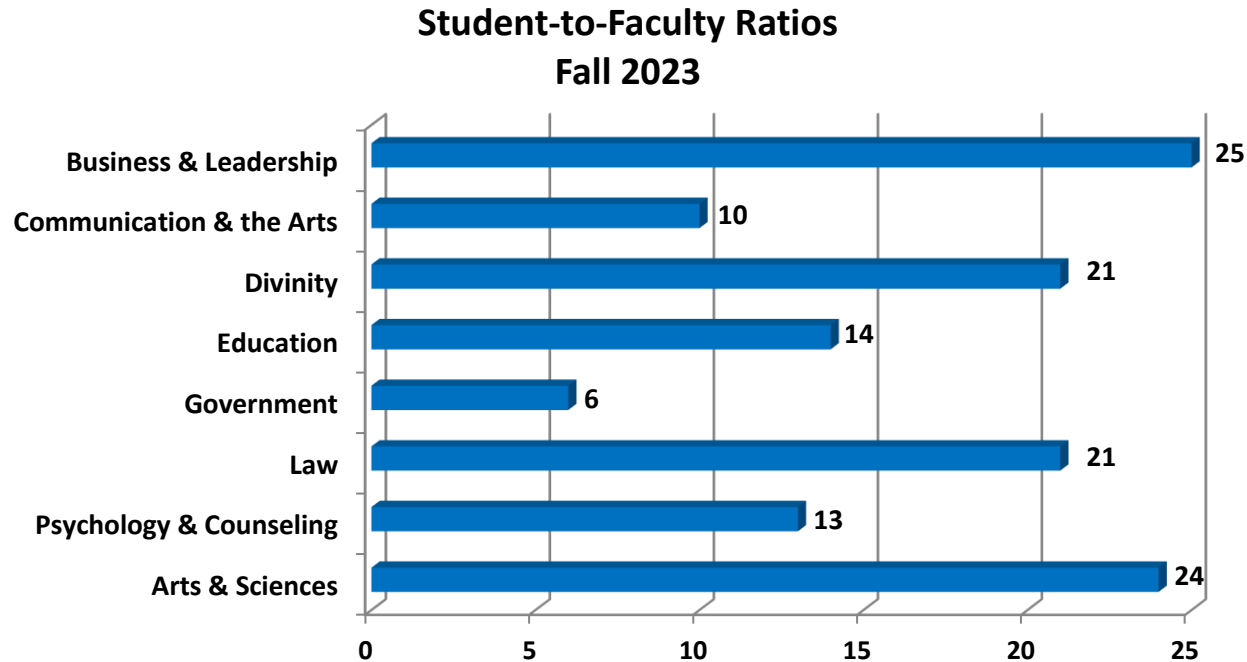

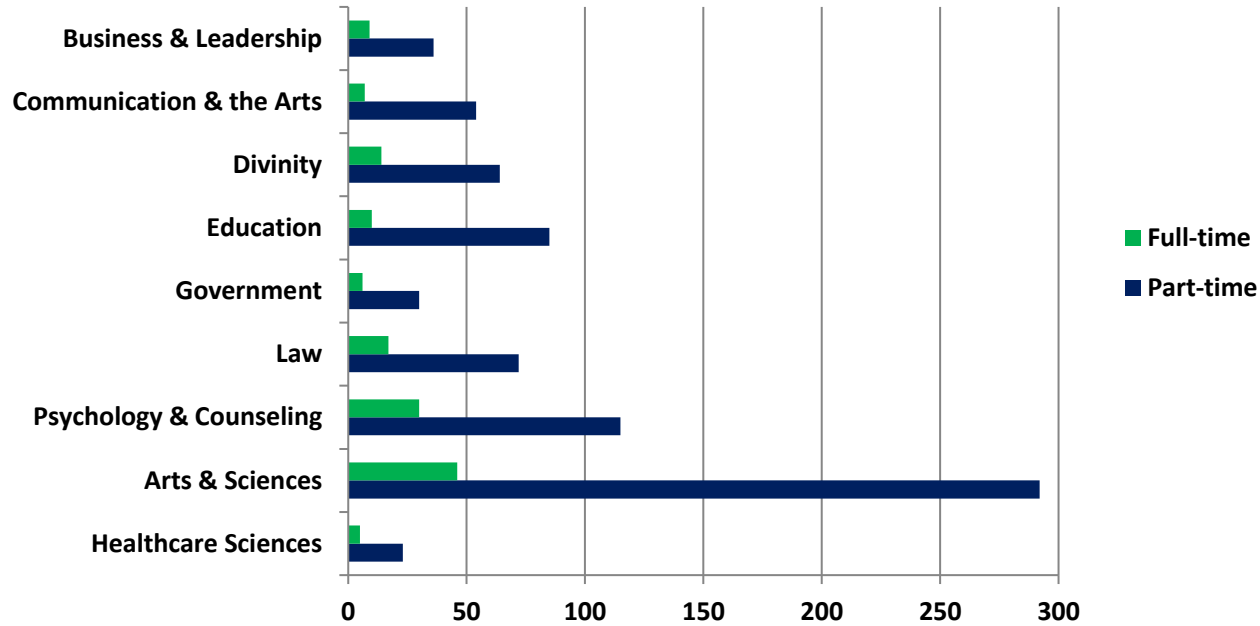

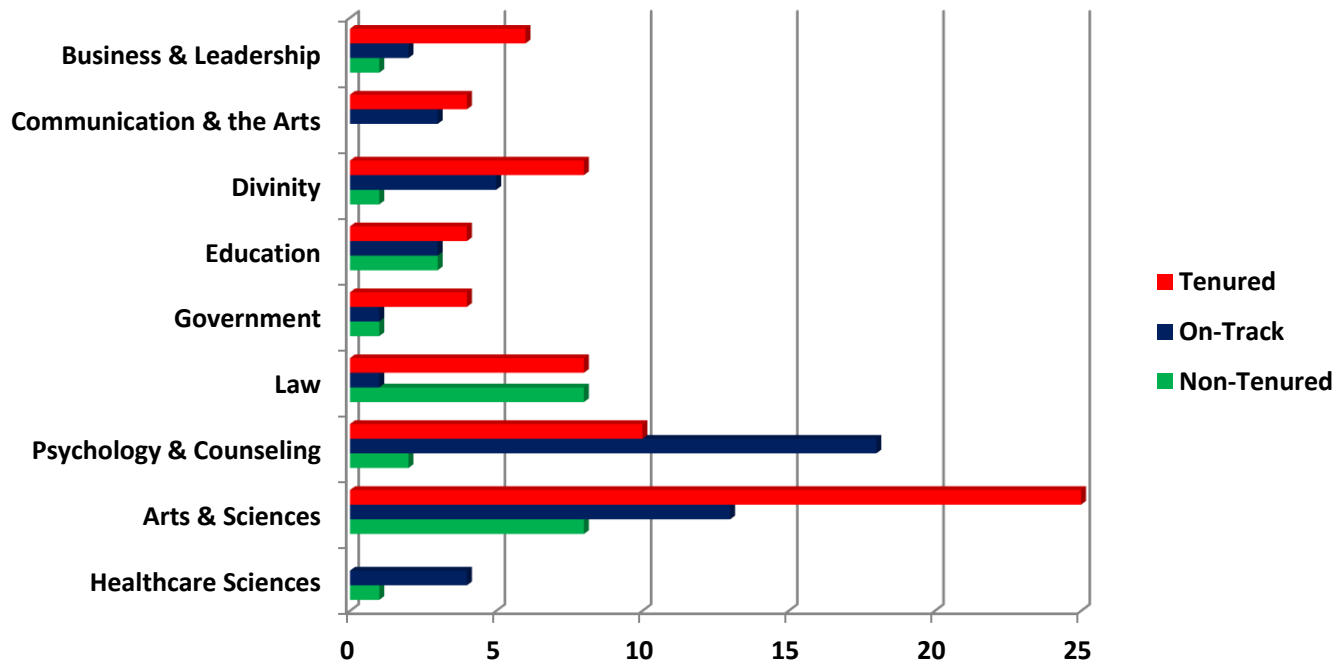

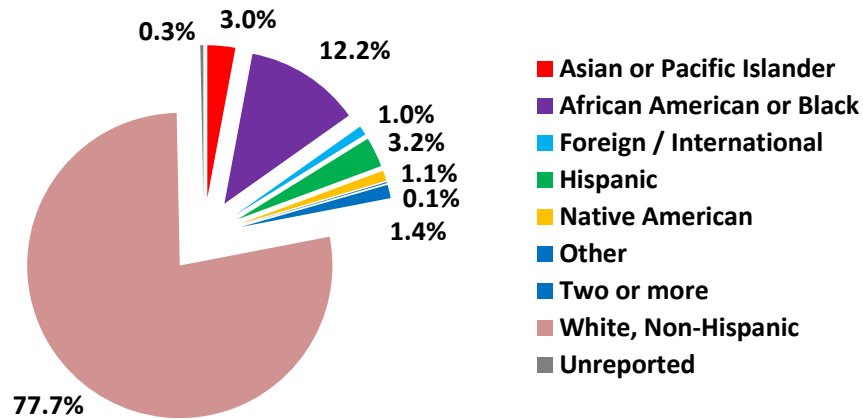

Regent University Facilities

Regent University's Virginia Beach Campus sits on 70 acres of immaculately maintained grounds that complement the Georgian architecture of its buildings which are historic in design yet incorporate the latest educational technology.

- Dedicated in October 1984, the **University Library** allows students to access scholarly resources nationwide via innovative technology available 24/7. The third floor of the library building houses the Law Library (established in 1986), the largest, most complete law library in Hampton Roads, with an extensive collection of federal and state materials. The library building also houses Mail Services, Copy Services, the Writing Lab, a Chapel, and both an auditorium and atrium for special events.



- Dedicated in the fall of 1994, **Robertson Hall** is named after Chancellor Pat Robertson's father, A. Willis Robertson, a former U.S. Senator from Virginia. Each floor has a different

style of columns: Doric, Ionic, and Corinthian. The building is equipped with audio/video technology and cameras for simultaneous broadcasting. The classrooms are tiered and seminar-sized. This 132,000-square-foot building houses the School of Law, the Robertson School of Government, Campus Ministries, and offices for the College of Arts & Sciences and American Center for Law and Justice, and a 376-seat moot



courtroom.

- The **Communication Building** houses pertinent areas of the School of Communication & the Arts, Performance Arts Center, Dede Robertson Theatre, Box Office, and faculty offices, along with Media Services, Career & Talent Management, Office of Corporate Partnerships, and Information Technology. Key elements include a 700+ seat proscenium arch theatre, a 195-seat experimental theatre, a TV studio, a film sound stage, nonlinear video editing suites, costume and scene shops, acting and dance labs, film screening theatres, a complete film production suite, a computer graphics

animation studio, and a film backlot. The Institute of Cybersecurity and premier cyber simulation lab also reside in this remarkable structure.



- Opened in late 2022, the two-story **Student Center** houses the offices of Students Services, Registrar, Counseling & Disability Services, Regent Royal Athletics, and the Center for Student Happiness. The Regent University Gift Shop, student leadership offices, student lounge, recreation room, a coffee shop, and a cafeteria-style dining facility called “The



Ordinary” are also here.

- **The Founders Inn & Spa** – This luxurious, Georgian-style Founders Inn and Spa provides vacation and business travelers with an unparalleled level of lodging hospitality. The four-

building complex provides 240 guest rooms and suites, spa facilities, swimming pools, formal gardens, meeting rooms, and two restaurants. The ballroom, which seats 1,400, has advanced technological capabilities.



- Built in 1979, the **Administration Building** was the first on-campus building of Regent University, formerly known as CBN University. The facility houses the offices of the executive leadership team, Administrative Services, Facilities & Engineering, Alumni Relations & Special Events, Human Resources, Marketing & Public Relations, and the Business Office. It also houses the School of Education and several



classrooms.

- **The Shaw Chapel** - Opened in March 2013, the Shaw Chapel is the centerpiece of campus life, providing a unifying venue where people can experience the presence of God. The chapel features a 950-seat sanctuary for services, convocations, commencements, and baptisms, as well as for individual reflection and prayer. A small prayer room is open around the clock for prayer, Bible studies, and devotions.



- **Welcome Center** – Connected to the Shaw Chapel by a covered walkway, the Divinity Building houses the Welcome Center, which provides prospective students with admissions guidance, campus tours, and answers to visitor inquiries. This building is also home to The Honors College, Military

Resource Center, Admissions offices, classrooms, meeting spaces, and offices for the School of Divinity.

- **Student Housing**

Regent Village—Open to graduate students with families, Regent Village consists of more than 200 two- and three-bedroom apartments located less than one mile from campus. **The Commons** is a 172,000-square-foot, two-building student housing complex that opened in 2007. Each residence hall provides fully furnished apartment-style living with versatile floor plans, which range in size from a studio to four-bedroom suites. Housing costs include furniture, electricity, cable television, Internet service, water, sewage, laundry rooms, a fitness center, and 24-hour security.



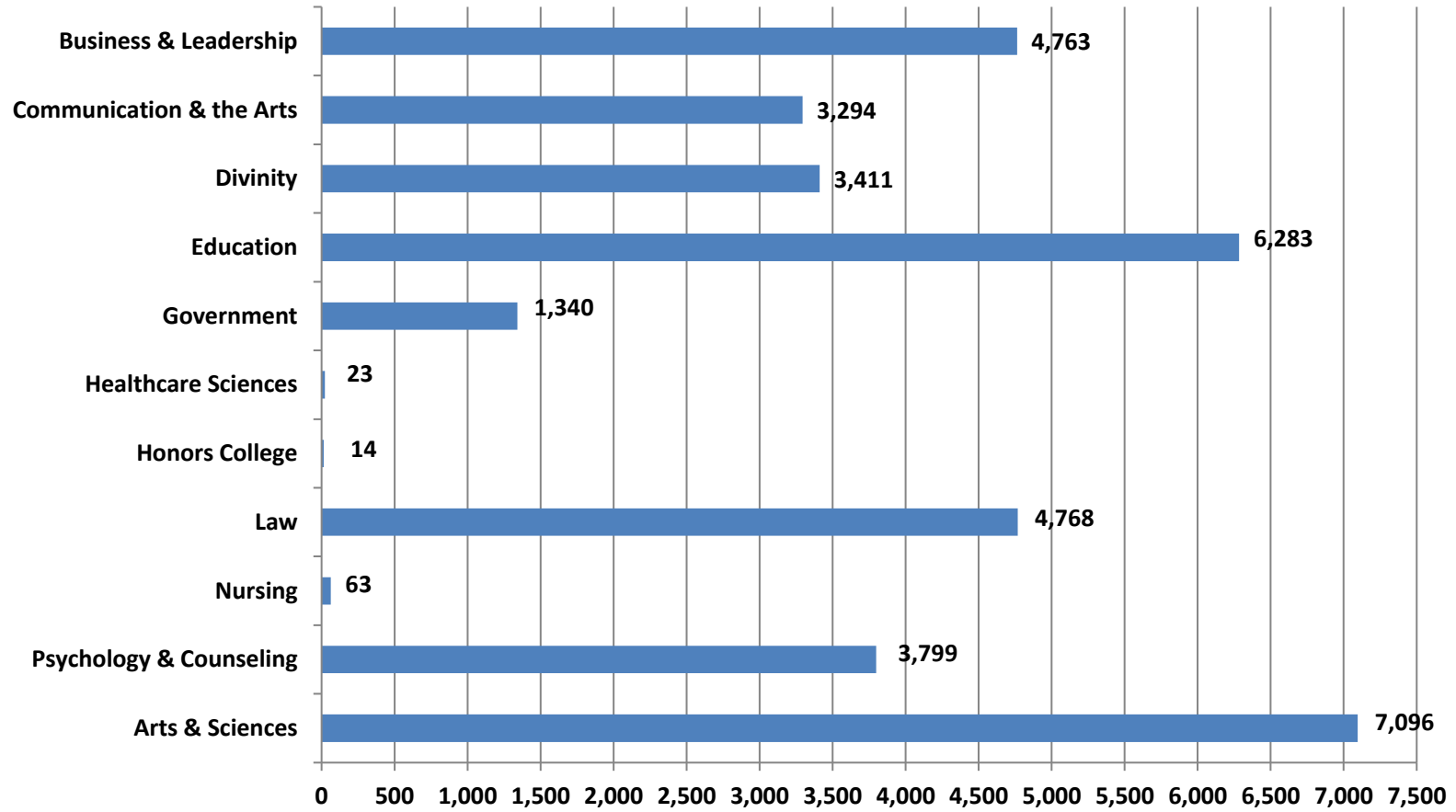
